**Attacking Syria unilaterally** is an *ill-considered idea* that does not deserve to come to a vote in the U.S. Congress, & besides, we'll be missing the mark.

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The productive question is:

## Will the International Community (the United Nations) decide to punish

- not Syria! but -

President Assad himself? ... If not: let us stay out of the fight.

Think about it:

Our opening move in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Gulf War was to ~unilaterally blow up part of downtown Baghdad... to "shock & awe" the Iraqi people when the *problem-individual* was **Sadam Hussein!** ... And later, the U.S.A. squandered a fortune attempting to rebuild the Iraq which we helped to destroy.

If Hussein caused "the problem"... he alone should have suffered the consequences.

If President Assad is causing "the problem"... he alone should suffer the consequences.

In any event:

Let's not do that. ("Shock & awe" was a product of our historical illiteracy... & our quaint perception of strategic attack options of the  $21^{st}$  century.)

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America "Losing Face" by <u>not</u> projecting power

(after President Obama "drew a line in the sand" on *chemical weapons use*)

makes little sense. WikiLeaks & prisoner torture demonstrate that we sacrificed some of our principles years ago; our national "ethics" are a house of cards; our governance is in gridlock; our national "face" is "toast".

The Chinese have grasped for centuries how insufferable English-speaking governance can be (recall: England's Opium War); the U.S.A.'s 21<sup>st</sup> century world leadership has been an ill-advised juggernaut.... China is arming itself in a big way—who would care to blame them?
